Dear Friends

Another year has nearly rolled by!

It is good that we get one of the highlights of the year towards the very end! We can celebrate the birth of the Lord Jesus Christ, at the darkest time of the year. We certainly need the light and love of Christ in our world at this time. The news around our globe seems so hopeless; so distressing and full of destruction and war.

However, we can approach the Christmas season with hope and confidence; because God has not left us to our own devices but has sent his most precious son. *"The Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth."* (John 1;14)

We celebrate "Emmanuel – God with us". Joseph is asked to name him Jesus "for he will save his people from their sins." (Matt 1:21).

Mary is also told the same thing; and it is then spelled out to her, "He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob for ever, and of his kingdom there will be no end." (Luke 1:32-33)

These are great and wonderful event; mind-blowing and earth shattering; especially as we are aware of the way the story goes!

These events, then, lie at the heart of our salvation; and at the very centre of the life and mission of the Church.

The way that Christmas falls this year means that there will be a temptation to get into our Christmas celebrations earlier than usual. I know of one Minister who used to say that we should not sing carols until Christ was born! I suspect that we will be much earlier than that!

But, please, don't let Advent be squeezed out. We all need that preparation time that is Advent as we approach the cataclysmic Christmas events. We need to hear of God's promises of old; of God's challenges and choices; of God's mercy and grace. Our belief is that all this did not happen by accident, but by the design and love of a gracious God.

We need time to contemplate and come to terms with this – Advent is such a time. So don't rush to sing your carols and set up your cribs – there will be plenty of time to fully celebrate.

Collect for the Second Sunday of Advent

God of all time and space, who are we, that you should come to us? Yet you have visited your people and redeemed us in your Son. As we prepare to celebrate his birth make our hears leap with joy at the sound of your word and move us by your Spirit to bless your wonderful works. We ask this through him whose coming is certain, whose day draws near, even Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen

CIRCUIT MEETING 22/11/23

The two main pieces of business at the circuit meeting were to approve new job descriptions and contracts for Sarah and Frank. Those were agreed, which is good news for our circuit. We very much value their work among us. The contracts are in the process of being prepared with the HR company the District uses.

There has been extensive discussion with Frank, Sarah, myself and the Leadership team about the way forward.

Sarah will now be taking on much of the Property portfolio within the circuit. For sometime we have been very aware that she has been doing more hours than she was contracted for. With this additional responsibility, we have agreed to increase Sarah's hours to 30. Sarah will continue to work in a flexible manner; which very much suits both her and us. This will, we hope fit in with the Richards' family life. We also agreed that Sarah will now be known as the "Circuit Manager"

Frank, has unbelievably, being working with us for nearly 3 years. His contract will therefore become permanent. This was a good opportunity to review what Frank does. His new job description reflects a more mission-based approach, via initiatives like the Book Club and Encircled in Care Course. Frank of course, now chairs the Pastoral Committees in all the Church Councils, which looks not only at pastoral concerns, but also our wider interaction with the local community. Frank will continue to work 35 hours a week. We also considered what the appropriate job title for Frank was. I was keen to remove the word "assistant", and to have a term that was understood, both within and outside the Church. We also talked to the District Chair about this, indeed Dan Haylett had conversations with Frank concerning his work among us. We have come up with the Title, "Circuit Lay Minister".

We were also able in the meeting to receive and approve the Circuit Accounts for 2022/23. Thanks must go to Elsie and David Potter, Paul Booth and our auditor Revd. Graham Thompson for their efficiency.

As part of the discussion about Sarah and Frank concern was raised from the meeting about days off and times that they are contacted. The same might be added for Andrew and myself.

It was felt that it is not unreasonable to suggest that emails and phone calls after 6pm should not take place **EXCEPT IN THE CASE OF AN EMERGENCY**. This last point is vital; and well understood by those working in a pastoral situations. We do and would want to respond should the need arise. Most of us, will have phones around that pick-up emails all the time; so it is likely that in an emergency we are always contactable. I think, I would add, to wait until after 8.30am in the morning.

In anticipation, thank you.

FROM REVD ANDREW VIDAMOUR

Dear Friends,

Perhaps one of the best known and loved poems about Christmas is the one by the former Poet Laureate, Sir John Betjeman. It is simply called 'Christmas', and it begins with a description of some of the familiar aspects of the festive season such as Church bells, holly, decorations and the exchange of gifts.

All these, no doubt, Betjeman wants to celebrate, even with dry humour as when he refers, for instance, to the gift of a 'hideous tie so kindly meant'. But then he goes on to remind us that all the trappings and trimmings of Christmas can never compare with the 'simple truth' which lies at the heart of the celebrations:

'That God was Man in Palestine/And lives today in Bread and Wine.'

Here Betjeman speaks of the bread and wine shared in the service of Holy Communion which is so central to Christian worship, not least on Christmas Eve. And this bread and wine may recall for us the ordinary life that Jesus lived, if in an extraordinary way. For bread and wine partly represent the basics of life – the 'bread and butter' of daily routine, which Jesus came to share and to help fill with the reality of God's loving-kindness.

But the bread and wine do not only point back to a life lived (and a death died) fully for God; they may also represent for us the potential and actual holiness of our lives now, both in the eyes of

God and in the creative, caring ways in which God may help us live now as we look for inspiration to the One who was born in a stable so long ago.

That birth put down a marker for the way Jesus would live – making the 'ordinary' special, just as he turned water into wine at a wedding. For Jesus was born and lived, of course, in humdrum circumstances, as a sign that our family relationships and friendships, and all the routine of daily life, may be enriched with the wonder of self-giving love not only at the festival of Christmas but every day of the year.

May God bless your celebrations with the joy and peace of the Christ-child. Andrew Vidamour


2. If you do not have a Theology X account, just go straight to the MCBX and register there to create an account.

OPTIONS FOR ADVANCED TRAINING:

E:Learning - Online through the MCBX platform

A learning experience which allows the learner to move through the course at their own pace. With a facilitated Gathered Session at the end of the learning via Zoom. Booking for this option will now be through Eventbrite, where delegates will first book onto a gathered course, which will generate their registration to the e:learning site automatically. These dates will be advertised shortly.

Streamed Training Events

Designed to offer a face-to-face experience for more people across the District at once, the Advanced Module (Live-Streamed) allows leaders in your church to do this training all together, but without needing to travel as far. Teaching will be offered over a live-stream, delivered via YouTube, with space for conversations in your local context, and ways to interact with the trainers. This option is open to Circuit Safeguarding officers to host in Circuit venues. Individuals will not be able to register and do course alone

Streamed Training Event explained and booking guidance

Designed to offer a face-to-face experience for more people across the District at once, the Advanced Module (Live-Streamed) allows leaders in your church to do this training all together, but without needing to travel as far. Teaching will be offered over a live-stream, delivered via YouTube, with space for conversations in your local context, and ways to interact with the trainers.

We will offer the Advanced Module Training as a live stream. This includes:

- All the teaching content, taught in-front of a live class, with breaks for discussion and coffee in your local venues
- A way to interact with the training team live during question and answer sessions
- A register sheet to enable your attendees to have a certificate of completion. This will be sent to them directly, or to yourself if for later distribution, via email

Host churches will offer:

- A warm, comfortable venue for 4.5hrs of training
- A chaplain for attendees
- A Circuit Safeguarding coordinator/officer for local questions and answers
- A way to show and interact with a live-stream, suitable for the size of your group. The solution you use depends on the size of the group: for a 5 or below, a TV with a laptop plugged in may suffice. A larger group may benefit from using a projector and PA system connected to a computer. Regardless, a reliable internet connection will be required throughout the event

FROM MAUREEN ELLIS AT BLACK TORRINGTON A Free Book!

As an ordinary Christian, now in my early eighties, I am still discovering what an exciting adventure it is to be a disciple of Jesus Christ!

I have at last finished writing a book called "Adventure with God – Cornwall Mission 2006 with Glorian Bonnette, Apostle like none other". It needed to be written to complete the story that Glorian (Glo) had started in two auto biographical books up to the point in 2003 when she met Roger Daniel. Of course, Glo intended to finish the story herself, but lost her battle with Pancreatic Cancer in 2007.

Glo had been travelling to Cornwall, from America, for 15 years of her 20 years as a disciple of Jesus. Her God-given assignment to "Take 100 strong and change the complexion of Cornwall" was enhanced by a vision - sparks of revival fire in Cornwall, crossing the Tamar, and going to Europe and far beyond.

Glo's last team of 42 (100 overall) was gathered from various States in the USA, included one from Poland, and four members of the very rural Shebbear Methodist Circuit in Devon, which of course is just across the Tamar!

How did it come about that Sheila and Roger Daniel, my husband, Peter, and myself were part of the team? In 2003, Roger, then a farmer, but also part-time coach driver, had been called upon to drive a party of Americans from Heathrow to St Ives when their driver fell ill. Roger and Sheila made sure Glo received an invitation to come to the Shebbear Methodist Circuit, which she did twice. We heard her story; and some of us asked if we could join her next mission, never having done anything like it in our lives before!

At the end of the 2006 mission, Glo believed her assignment was complete – "Signed, sealed, delivered!" she whispered to me when I read to the team a poem I had written to try and express all that the mission had meant to me. "Signed, sealed, delivered!" became the final line of the poem.

The book is written but not published. It is freely available to anyone who can receive an attachment by email. I have sent a few emails to members of Glo's team in America. Do send me an email if you would like a copy. In due time you might then receive a copy of my second book as well!

St. Columba

The island of Iona lies off the west coast of Scotland. It is barely three miles long and one mile wide and St. Columba arrived there in 563AD from Ireland. He built his first Celtic Church on the island and founded a monastic community. He then began to convert many in pagan Scotland and in Northern England to the Christian faith. The island became a sacred place and many Scottish Kings are buried there. Columba and his followers spread the Gospel message more than anyone else had done in Britain at that time.

Born in Donegal, Ireland, Columba was related to the Irish Kings. He became a monk and was ordained as a priest. There are many stories of miracles that occurred during his ministry including his subduing of a ferocious beast which some have related to the Loch Ness monster! He established many churches in the Hebrides and Iona became a centre of education for missionaries. He also wrote hymns and transcribed a number of books.

He died in 597AD and was buried on the island by his monks. Two centuries later lona was invaded by the Vikings and in 849AD his remains were removed from the island, some to Scotland and some to Ireland! He was never canonised as a Saint by the Pope but was treated as a Saint by the Celtic Church while he was still alive.

The present Abbey on the island was probably built in the C14th and is the spiritual home of the lona Community today which is ecumenical and popular with pilgrims. In 2021 the Community established a renewable energy scheme along with high speed broadband!

UNITED METHODIST CHURCH - COVENANT RENEWAL SERVICE

In 1663 Richard Alleine, a Puritan, published Vindiciae Pietatis: or, "A Vindication of Godliness in the Greater Strictness and Spirituality of It". In 1753, it was again published in John Wesley's "A Christian Library". Wesley used one chapter, "The Application of the Whole," on Monday, August 11, 1755, in what probably was the first real celebration of the Covenant Service in the Methodist movement.

Wesley found the service rich and meaningful, as expressed in his Journal: "Many mourned before God, and many were comforted" (April 1756); "It was, as usual, a time of remarkable blessing" (October 1765). "It was an occasion for a variety of spiritual experiences ... I do not know that ever we had a greater blessing. Afterwards many desired to return thanks, either for a sense of pardon, for full salvation, or for a fresh manifestation of His graces, healing all their backslidings" (January 1, 1775). In London these services were usually held on New Year's Day. Around the country the Covenant Service was conducted whenever John Wesley visited the Methodist Societies.

This service is an adaption of Wesley's.

The heart of the service, focused in the Covenant Prayer, requires persons to commit themselves to God. This covenant is serious and assumes adequate preparation for and continual response to the covenant.

WESLEY'S COVENANT SERVICE

INVITATION

Commit yourselves to Christ as his servants. Give yourselves to him, that you may belong to him. Christ has many services to be done. Some are more easy and honourable, others are more difficult and disgraceful.

Some are suitable to our inclinations and interests,

others are contrary to both.

In some we may please Christ and please ourselves.

But then there are other works where we cannot please Christ except by denying ourselves.

It is necessary, therefore,

that we consider what it means to be a servant of Christ.

Let us, therefore, go to Christ, and pray:

Let me be your servant, under your command. I will no longer be my own. I will give up myself to your will in all things.

Be satisfied that Christ shall give you your place and work.

Lord, make me what you will. Christ will be the Savior of none but his servants.He is the source of all salvation to those who obey.Christ will have no servants except by consent;Christ will not accept anything except full consent to all that he requires.Christ will be all in all, or he will be nothing.

Confirm this by a holy covenant.

To make this covenant a reality in your life, listen to these admonitions:

First, set apart some time, more than once,

to be spent alone before the Lord;

in seeking earnestly God's special assistance

and gracious acceptance of you;

in carefully thinking through all the conditions of the covenant;

in searching your hearts

whether you have already freely given your life to Christ.

Consider what your sins are.

Consider the laws of Christ, how holy, strict, and spiritual they are, and whether you, after having carefully considered them, are willing to choose them all.

Be sure you are clear in these matters, see that you do not lie to God.

Second, be serious and in a spirit of holy awe and reverence.

Third, claim God's covenant,

rely upon God's promise of giving grace and strength,

so you can keep your promise.

Trust not your own strength and power.

Fourth, resolve to be faithful. You have given to the Lord your hearts, you have opened your mouths to the Lord, and you have dedicated yourself to God. With God's power, never go back.

And last, be then prepared to renew your covenant with the Lord. Fall down on your knees, lift your hands toward heaven, open your hearts to the Lord, as we pray:

COVENANT PRAYER

The people kneel or bow.

O righteous God, for the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, see me as I fall down before you. Forgive my unfaithfulness in not having done your will, for you have promised mercy to me if I turn to you with my whole heart.

God requires that you shall put away all your idols.

I here from the bottom of my heart renounce them all, covenanting with you that no known sin shall be allowed in my life. Against your will, I have turned my love toward the world. In your power I will watch all temptations that will lead me away from you. For my own righteousness is riddled with sin, unable to stand before you.

Through Christ, God has offered to be your God again if you would let him.

Before all heaven and earth,

I here acknowledge you as my Lord and God. I take you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, for my portion, and vow to give up myself, body and soul, as your servant, to serve you in holiness and righteousness all the days of my life.

God has given the Lord Jesus Christ as the only way and means of coming to God.

Jesus, I do here on bended knees accept Christ as the only new and living Way, and sincerely join myself in a covenant with him. O blessed Jesus, I come to you, hungry, sinful, miserable, blind, and naked, unworthy even to wash the feet of your servants. *I do here, with all my power, accept you as my Lord and Head. I renounce my own worthiness,*

and vow that you are the Lord, my righteousness. I renounce my own wisdom, and take you for my only guide. I renounce my own will, and take your will as my law.

Christ has told you that you must suffer with him.

I do here covenant with you, O Christ, to take my lot with you as it may fall. Through your grace I promise that neither life nor death shall part me from you.

God has given holy laws as the rule of your life.

I do here willingly put my neck under your yoke, to carry your burden. All your laws are holy, just, and good.

I therefore take them as the rule for my words, thoughts, and actions, promising that I will strive

to order my whole life according to your direction, and not allow myself to neglect anything I know to be my duty.

The almighty God searches and knows your heart.

O God, you know that I make this covenant with you today without guile or reservation.

If any falsehood should be in it, guide me and help me to set it aright. And now, glory be to you, O God the Father,

whom I from this day forward shall look upon as my God and Father. Glory be to you, O God the Son,

who have loved me and washed me from my sins in your own blood, and now is my Savior and Redeemer.

Glory be to you, O God the Holy Spirit,

who by your almighty power have turned my heart from sin to God.

O mighty God, the Lord Omnipotent, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, you have now become my Covenant Friend.

And I, through your infinite grace, have become your covenant servant. So be it.

And let the covenant I have made on earth be ratified in heaven. Amen.

Comment

You are advised to make this covenant not only in your heart, but in word; not only in word, but in writing. Therefore, with all reverence, lay the service before the Lord as your act and deed. And when you have done this, sign it. Then keep it as a reminder of the holy agreement between God and you that you may remember it during doubts and temptations.

Creating 'Spaces for Grace': The Heart of Methodism's Mission by Leslie Newton.

Arguably the most influential driver for the remarkable growth of early Methodism was Wesley's creation of a dynamic network of 'spaces for grace.' As Wesley's own life was shaped by God's amazing grace, so he discovered that receiving and responding to grace is foundational to everyone's growing in faith and, crucially, something best done *together*.

Grace, of course, is a cherished treasure at the heart of Christianity in general, but for Methodists it has historically held a particularly rich and distinctive place. "For the 'people called Methodists' grace is nothing less than the defining, shaping and underpinning energy that flows at the very heart of the movement."[1] It embraces the Wesley-an 'waves of grace'[2]: 'prevenient grace', 'justifying grace' and 'sanctifying grace.'[3] Alongside these 'waves of grace' we also have the 'means of grace' (such as prayer, scripture, communion, fasting, and conferring). Devoting ourselves to the 'means of grace' is vital if God's transforming grace is going to continue to help us grow. As Randy Maddox so helpfully puts it, it's about "responsible grace"[4]: we have our part to play, responsibly, in continuing to grow in grace.

So, here's some challenge for us.

- Is there not a danger that we have lost confidence in the power of God's grace to transform us, our communities and the world?
- Have we instead too often settled for a church that runs more on guilt than grace, more out of anxiety than assurance?
- Is it not high time that we once again yield our lives, and our life together, to the transformative potential of God's grace?
- •

As I began, part of John Wesley's genius lay in creating a network of 'spaces for grace.' These included the field, bands, classes and societies, where 'waves of grace' flowed as people attended to the 'means of grace' together. Through this lens our discipleship is first and foremost forged by our intentional, risky-but-committed participation in this network of 'spaces of grace.' Out of this is shaped our response: in vocation, service and generous gracious living.

What does this all mean for us as the Methodist Church today? My hunch is that we need to focus our best imagination and energy in recreating and developing a rich tapestry of purposeful 'spaces for grace.'

With space-limited bluntness, I point to two radical reorientations I think are essential:

- 1. *Away from* attaching too much expectation about the Sunday congregational gathering being able to achieve all that is so often implied. These times can indeed be a 'space for grace' but they should not be seen as the primary building block of a movement seeking to be fashioned and empowered by 'waves of grace' and through 'means of grace.'
- 2.

Towards, a greater commitment to smaller, committed groups focussed around an openness to God's unexpected activity, mutual accountability, and deeper sharing. All with an expectant longing for more of Jesus' gracious presence.

- Away from too easy a satisfaction, all too often, with 'just' providing opportunities for people to be gathered together. Of course, there is often enormous benefit and Christian service in such times (coffee mornings, warm spaces, speaker-led fellowship gatherings etc.) They are good: they can be wonderful 'spaces for grace,' particularly of prevenient grace. But without them being part of a fuller network of 'spaces for grace' we are so limited and limiting in what we are offering.
 - *Towards,* alongside such gatherings, a more courageous, Jesus-centred offering of other spaces; spaces of grace with huge contextual variety and shade, but with an intentionality to share the Jesus story, to invite people to grow in grace, to discover the Good News of the gospel personally that Jesus really is *Emmanuel* God with us that he really has moved into every neighbourhood, full of grace and truth.

Wesley quickly learned that a network and flow of 'spaces of grace' was vital for the 'people called Methodists' to continue to grow in grace and for new people to enter into, and grow in, a life of faith. [5] What was true then is true now.

So, at a time when the church is prone to be almost paralyzingly anxious that it is running low on resources of money, energy and even time, let's celebrate that the resource we most need – grace – is inexhaustible and in constant supply! Might we then set about developing a richer, more diverse and creative network of 'spaces of grace' that once again offer us – and the world – the hope of spiritual and social transformation?


