FROM REV ROB BLACKHALL – SUPERINTENDENT MINISTER

Dear Friends,

One of the joys of being a Methodist Minister is being alongside the people of God in our Chapels; sharing with the saints, the term that the New Testament uses when refereeing to God's people. I appreciate your generosity, in practice and in thought. A caring and loving attitude; displaying discernment and wisdom. In short being the light and salt that Jesus refers to in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:13-16), putting the love of Jesus into reality. Later, Jesus compares the Kingdom of heaven to being yeast (Matthew 13:33); and I will testify to the way in which so many of our folk make a quiet difference to their communities. So much goes on, which is not seen; but is very much part of the Christian way. Thank you.

One of the sadness of being a Methodist Minister is being alongside some of the people of God in our Chapels and beyond. Locally, around our District and indeed nationally I have witnessed

words, both written and spoken; as well as in actions, done and not done; which I am afraid do not reflect well upon us. Words of a self-righteous nature; often judgmental in character; which suggest that someone hasn't been near their New Testament recently. Lacking discernment; and having the affect of undermining and devaluing the contribution of others. To paraphrase the words of St Paul, more resounding gong and clanging cymbal than the language of love (1 Cor 13).

We can all get it wrong; and indeed, it seems so on most days. The need to say our confessions to Almighty God and say sorry to others remains.

Jesus observed, "Every kingdom divided against itself will be ruined, and every city or household divided against itself will not stand." (Matthew 12:25). The Church today, in every shape and form, needs friends; not the back-biting. It needs the positives of the Kingdom of God; not the negatives.

My mother, now there was a wise woman; would say to her four waring children, "If you cannot say anything nice, then don't say anything at all". You see, I did listen.

We are all to face in the coming months, a General Election. I fear for the public discourse; for the way that politicians speak to each other is quite frankly unedifying and unhelpful. A general election of mud slinging is not what the country needs. There are serious issues to discuss and debate. As there are in the Church; but before we can comment don't we need to put our own house in order?

Barnabas, a fellow traveler with Saint Paul, is lauded for being an encourager. That is a good label to have; and to have that said of you.

In Romans 16, a chapter, that reads a bit like an appendix, Paul mentions a whole series of names; some of whom we know from other places; but others that make the briefest of brief appearances in our scriptures. They are thanked and praised for their work for the sake of the Gospel. These are people, in ways we don't really know, who built up and supported the work of Christ Jesus. You know it is a joy to be a Methodist Minister and to be around the saints; well, most of the time.

During Andrew's times away, those will be published. Frank Watson will be the first port of call for Pastoral issues for Bideford, Littleham, Northam and Parkham. I shall assume Pastoral Charge during that time. Other things, will come to me or to the Circuit stewards.

More details will be discussed at the Church Councils.

At the same time we are looking again at the roles that the staff play so we can equalize up work loads and enable us to move forward as a circuit to fulfil OUR CALLING; to be the people of God in this place.

FROM REVD ANDREW VIDAMOUR

Dear friends,

In 1913, one of my great-grandfathers was a founder member of the West United Agricultural and Horticultural Show in Guernsey. He served on the Show Committee for some years, as did my grandfather, later on, so I have a strong family connection to the event, which is thankfully still going strong.

This year, I have been fortunate to attend the hundredth West Show (several had to be cancelled due to the World Wars and foot-and-mouth disease). This was a great success, with fine weather and large crowds. I was both interested and moved to see an Exhibition of the history of the Show, as well as enjoying the usual features of the event. Unusually, too, I visited the North Show in Guernsey this year.

Afterwards, I reflected that such events share some common features with the Kingdom of God (or the Kingdom of Heaven, as it is sometimes called). Both are diverse: they include people of all ages, nationalities, personalities and so on. Also, people's gifts and talents are welcomed and nurtured: at the Shows, in the produce and handicraft classes, for example, there is a celebration of people's skills and creativities, and, while some prizes are awarded, all the entries are displayed and effort is as highly valued as attainment.

Likewise, as we consider the parables of Jesus about the Kingdom of God, for instance, we often find themes of growth, nurture, welcome and hospitality – in such parables as the Mustard Tree (e.g. Mark 4: 30-32) and the Great Feast (e.g. Matthew 22: 1-13). There is a radical equality and a focus on human flourishing here. And partly as a result of all this, there may come great joy: how good it was, to see so many people enjoying the Shows in Guernsey, in bright sunshine, and this may echo the work of the Holy Spirit in our hearts and lives, in the Church, in our communities and in our world as we rejoice in the mercy and generosity of God in Jesus Christ.

Monday mornings at Wesley College, 1975, were liturgy with the formidable Raymond George. "Leo, you seem to be reading something under the table" "Oh Mr George, it's the Birmingham football paper, I brought it in to ask if you think it is appropriate to have a thanksgiving service for Villa winning the League Cup!"

There were always two sides to Leo. He was one of the wisest leaders in Methodism, ministering at large and lively churches, a much loved and respected Chair of the Newcastle District, President of Conference and latterly Chair of the Resignations Panel, lead in Methodist - Roman Catholic discussions, valued member of the Faith and Order Committee and mentor to many.

His ministry was threaded through with pastoral care, which was the theme of his 2011 Presidential year. Without formal academic qualifications he was scholarly, reflective, well read and a fine preacher. He offered deep wisdom and prayerful insight into the leadership of Methodism, many were grateful for a discreet and timely word in times of trouble.

He never forget his evangelical roots, in later years adding to that richness the treasures of pilgrimage and contemplative Celtic spirituality. He faithfully served the Lord he loved all his life, the mind of Christ his Saviour ruled his life in everything.

The other side of Leo wider Methodism may not always have seen. He was hilariously funny, with an acerbic wit aimed at all and sundry, but especially towards friends who were in his view unfortunate enough not to support Aston Villa!

In all his ministry Leo was wonderfully supported by Charlotte. Theirs was a marriage marked by individuality, mutuality and love. Charlotte's support to Leo throughout his various ministries was returned as he supported her late call to Anglican ministry. Leo was a friend to so many, he was my best friend. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

STATEMENT IN RESPONSE TO THE PRIME MINISTER'S ANNOUNCEMENT ON NET ZERO POLICIES

A joint statement by The Baptist Union of Great Britain The Methodist Church The United Reformed Church

We are dismayed that the Prime Minister is delaying the implementation of policies to achieve net zero. As Christian leaders we are deeply committed to encouraging all within our sphere of influence to be ambitious in reaching net zero as we seek to care for God's creation. This transition must be rapid, equitable and just.

At a time when so many people are struggling financially, the government has a crucial role to play in ensuring the cost of transition to net zero does not fall most heavily on those least able to afford it. Delaying measures to insulate homes will have the opposite effect, and slowing efforts to reduce fossil fuel use will increase climate impacts on vulnerable communities around the globe.

Extreme weather events this year have demonstrated the urgency of the situation. The independent Climate Change Committee have assessed that even current policy measures are insufficient to meet the UK's climate targets. The government needs to urgently demonstrate how it will get the UK back on track to reach net zero before 2050.

The commitments made at COP26 were instrumental in providing confidence to industry, investors and civil society that the UK was serious about rising to the climate challenge. It is a source of

extreme disappointment that the Prime Minister's announcement will damage that confidence and undermine our collective efforts. As a country, we have moral and legal responsibilities to show leadership in tackling the climate emergency together.

FROM MANUALS TO HANDBOOKS – PRAYING FOR METHODIST MISSION

Over the past ten years, more than 280,000 copies of the Methodist Prayer Handbook provided Methodists around the world with prayers to support God's work. These are crucial for helping all Methodist people pray for what God is doing with, and through, fellow Methodists across the world and in Great Britain.

Every year, a new edition offers the Church prayers by and for Methodists in local churches, districts and partner churches in other countries. By submitting and praying these prayers, we, as Methodist people, are living out Our Calling.

Our Calling is responding to the gospel of God's love in Christ. So, when we write a prayer for, or pray a prayer in, the Handbook, we are part of God's big gospel plan. That's why it is inspiring to use the Handbook – a global publication having at its heart God's global purposes. This is the story of the Handbook: how it developed, and how it continues to develop. As an annual publication it changes according to changes across the Church, because these require new prayers for new situations. Both local and global.

All the world

John Wesley wrote in 1739 that "I look on all the world as my parish". And so as Methodists engaged in God's mission we pray. But it was not until 1813 that members of Leeds Wesleyan Methodist Circuit gathered to consider "all the world". The meeting resulted in The Methodist Missionary Society for the Leeds District.

Similar societies formed in Halifax, York, Sheffield, Cornwall and Newcastle. But Leeds was the foundation for the connexional Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society, established in 1818.

Past prayers for Methodist mission

Not everyone could go abroad as a Methodist missionary, but everyone could pray. During the nineteenth century, the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society supported "intelligent" daily prayer requests for specific mission work or places where the Society was engaged. Around the 1890s, a "fellowship of missionary intercession", the Wesleyan Helpers' Union, used a guide called *What to Pray For.*

This offered "a compendium of missionary information in a cycle of a month", organised not by geography, but by missionary fields: for example, education, and medicine. *What to Pray For* was a product of its time with directive imperialist, language; neither inclusive nor ecumenical.

Later called a Manual, published by the Missionary Society and then the Methodist Church Overseas Division, it contained prayers from day 1 to 28 for the Methodist Church worldwide, while day 29 was for the Methodist Church in Ireland, day 30 for the Methodist Church in Britain, and finally day 31 for the World Council of Churches. When the Church's structures changed in 1996, the Prayer Handbook's scope broadened to add the Methodist Church in Britain's districts opposite worldwide church partners.

Connected for modern mission

Today, the Methodist Prayer Handbook is still arranged as a monthly cycle. Each day's prayers continue to guide Methodists in praying for our church partners in other countries, alongside British districts and programmes for living out Our Calling.
